How to help your child resist peer pressure

Helping your child to develop a strong sense of identity and their own opinions can help them to resist peer pressure. Here are a few suggestions taken from Big Life Journal Parenting Resource: Let them choose music for drives in the car.

Why do you like this song? How does it make you feel? What other types of music do you like? Help them develop their own sense of style.

What colour combinations do you like best? How do you want your outfit to make you feel?

Help them develop opinions about current events. What do you think about the situation? If you don't understand something, how would you get answers?

Play 'What If' games together.

What if you didn't have to go to school? What would you do instead?

If you could study anything at school, what would it be?

When you routinely ask non-judgemental questions and accept their opinions...

You help them develop a strong sense of identity and resist peer pressure.

Museum Explorers Workshop

On Tuesday the 6th December, 6th Class did an online workshop with the Museum of Decorative Arts & History. It was called 'Museum Explorers' and it was very interesting. We learned lots of new facts about Collins Barracks and Stokes Tapestry. We played a few games and we had to try and figure out the backstory and purpose of each artefact. Virtual Workshop with the Natural History Museum

On the 30th November, 6th Class did a virtual workshop with the Natural History Museum. The museum preserves animals in different ways by drying and stuffing them, and they're kept in a special alcohol. Some aren't preserved at all, they're just bones. Geraldine told us how peregrine falcons almost went extinct due to harmful pesticides. We also learned that tons of animals, such as the Giant Irish Deer, went extinct due to the cold, and that rats originated in Asia. We were also shown some taxidermied animals. We're very thankful for Geraldine's talk and we enjoyed it a lot.

Our pupils loved learning Italian last year thanks to the trojan work of parent and post primary teacher, Salvo Cacciato. This year, we will be welcoming Ms. Jenny Healy will be teaching Irish Sign Language (ISL) to the senior end classes (3rd-6th) during January, February and March. This is another exciting and interesting opportunity for our pupils and we are delighted to be able to take part once again!



Dance Classes

Veronika Sardoku will take the pupils for dance classes once again this term. All pupils really enjoy and greatly benefit from learning dance- it helps with confidence, coordination, motor skills and teamwork. The cost of our Term 2 in school Dance lessons is covered by the pupil contribution, which is greatly appreciated by all.

Pupil Financial Contributions

Many thanks to those who have paid their pupil contributions to date. Without these contributions, the school would not be able to function and therefore, we encourage all parents to do their best to participate in the scheme. So far this year, the pupil contributions have been spent on:

- 24/7 additional pupil personal accident insurance for all pupils. Some parents have already made claims for accidents that their children have had outside of school already this year.
- Drama classes for all pupils for the first term. Dance classes will take place in the second term. Gymnastics lessons will take place in the third term.
- 6th Class visit to Christ Church Cathedral.
- Professional PE coaching for all pupils.
 Please note that the school no longer charges for Playball coaching during the school day and the cost of this is included in the Pupil Contribution.
- Class teachers have spent €15 per pupil on art and craft materials.
- Class teachers have spent €15 per pupil on reading materials for pupils in their classrooms.

- Photocopying, binding and laminating of pupil work and teaching resources.
- Computer software and licenses, IT maintenance including pupil iPads and laptops.
- Replacement furniture and equipment.
- Visiting speakers and workshops for pupils- Marine Environment science workshop for all pupils in Term 1. More workshops will be taking place over the rest of the year.
- Assistance with shortfalls on general running costs such as heating and electricity, stationery, maintenance, stamps, parent text messaging facility and cleaning services.

The tradition with our pupil contribution is that we do not ask for lots of smaller amounts of money throughout the year for each activity. That is why it might seem higher than some other schools who would also charge parents for individual activities as well as set charges for photocopying, reading material, stationery, art supplies etc. throughout the year, however please bear in mind the range of activities and resources that we spend the pupil contributions on. really is good value when you see the many ways in which our pupils benefit from it. We would strongly urge all parents to contributethe monthly standing order. It is quite convenient and can be easily set up on request from the office. We are able to budget as we know it is coming in. We also very much appreciate the prompt return of the Charity Tax Refund forms which you have been sent if you needed to complete one. This enables the school to claim a tax refund based on your pupil contribution as we are a registered charity. This means less fundraising during the year!! 

Aladdin Parent App

A reminder that you should enter your child's absence reasons on the app. You do not need to send in a paper form and can do this really easily on the app. If your child is going to be late in for any reason, you can also enter this on the app so then the teacher knows not to mark your child absent. You can also check back over your child's attendance records via the app.

Stav Safe

The Stay Safe Programme will be taught to all classes during Term 2. The aim of the Stay Safe programme is to teach children personal safety skills so they can look after themselves in situations which could be upsetting or dangerous. It deals initially with common situations which most children will experience at some stage or other, e.g. getting lost or being bullied. The programme also teaches children the safety skills necessary to protect themselves from physical or sexual abuse and emphasises the importance of telling a trusted adult about any problems they have.

The Stay Safe programme is part of the Social, Personal and Health Education curriculum which all primary schools are required to implement. Co-operation between parents and teachers is essential to the success of this programme. It is important that parents are aware of the content of the Stay Safe lessons and are able to discuss the lessons with their children. Your child may bring home worksheets which will inform you about the topics being covered in class and how you can reinforce the messages at home. Your child's teacher will send you a note on Stay Safe when they start the programme. If

you have any questions, you can speak to them about it.
